All of them should already have a category for charitable donations, Loans, real estate and other things that you use for tax preparation. Make a paper file for receipts that are not shown on your bank statement.
- If you use paper files, like many people do, make a file for each of the areas that you collect receipts for tax purposes.
- Get rid of paperwork that you don't need. No one needs old bank statements, investments statements or past utility bills. Shred any of them that have your personal information on them.
